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THE ANTIMUSEUM

Bringing the distant close and tearing down the walls

Bringing close (in time and space) by supporting the journey back to the personal...

Tearing down the walls by 1) taking more of the everyday world into the exhibition space, and 2) taking relevant exhibits further into the world. Things and their role in experiences...

People have a lot of things. What do they see/touch/smell/etc in contemplating them? How does context affect their connection with them?

Museums typically also have a lot of things. And make experiences to frame them. Which requires choosing a context...

Places that throw people out of the immediate and into other worlds:

- The world of the thing
- A world in which one can experience another slice of life
- A world of concerns that can be brought home
- The world of one's own concerns








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Older people responded well to a sense of trajectory – in this case, backwards.
